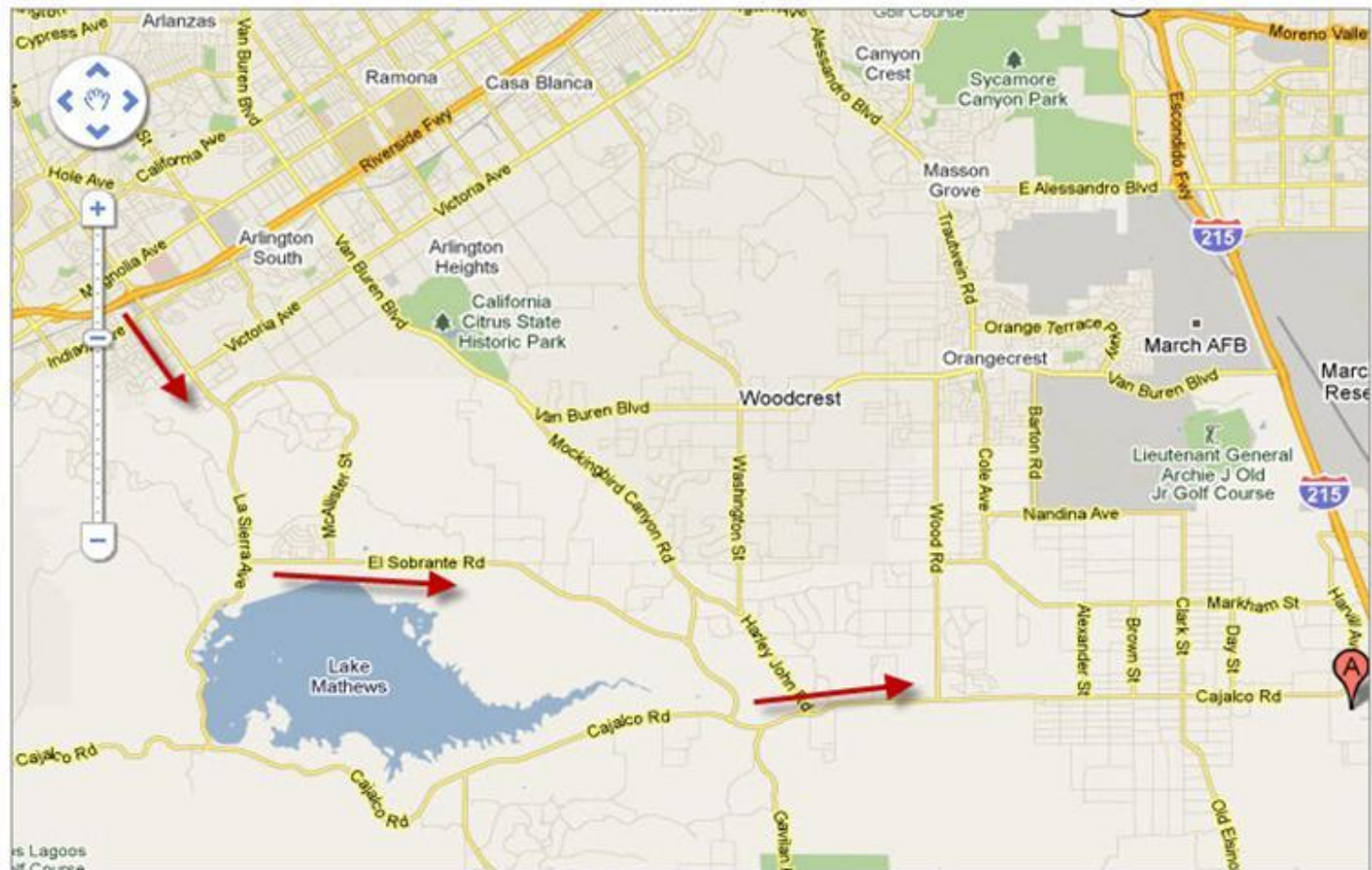

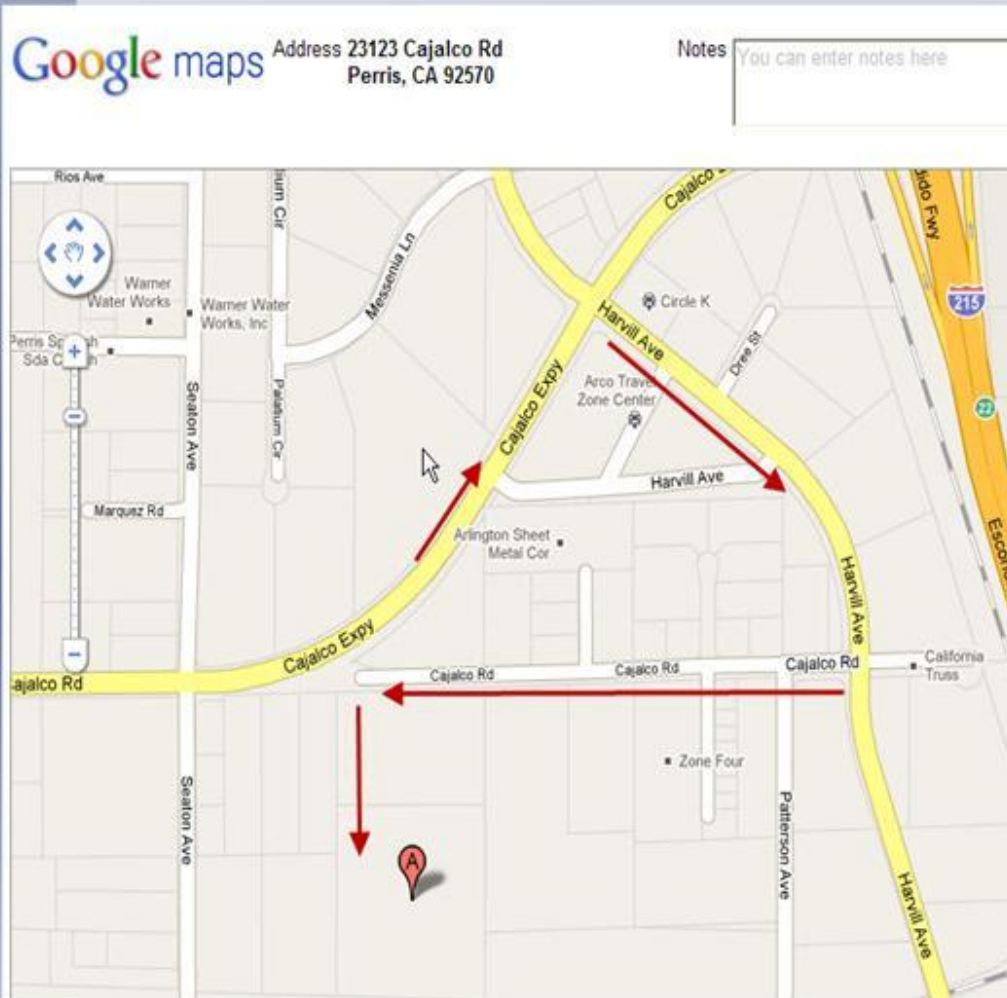

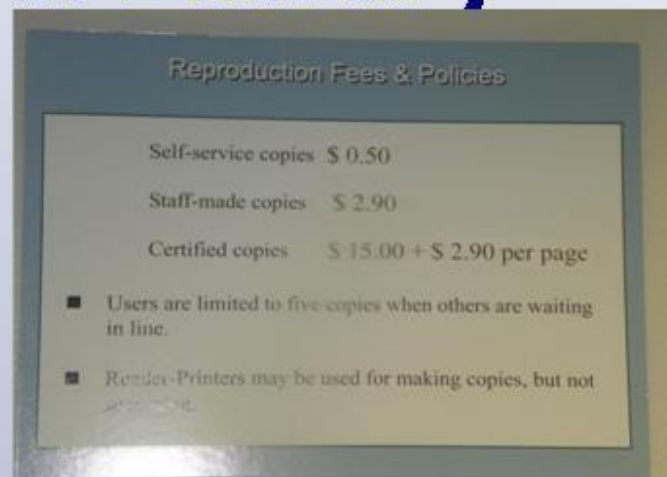

BEFORE YOU GO TO NARA

Three important limitations face genealogists

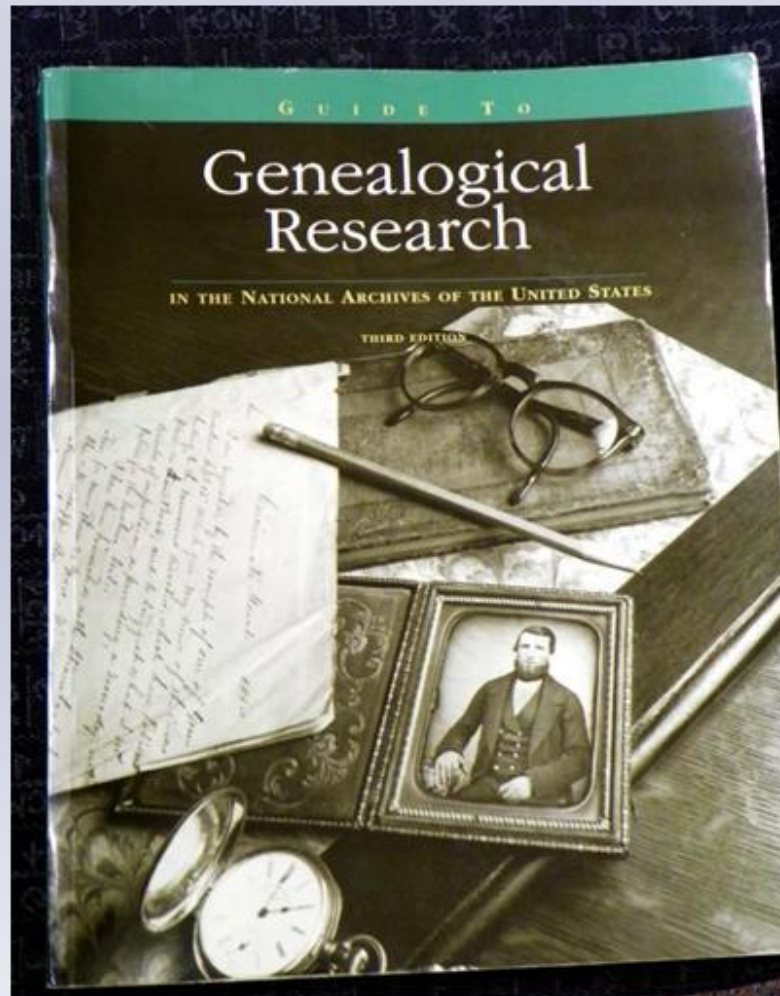
First: NARA keeps only federal records. Birth, marriage, and death records, the milestones of life and the backbone of genealogy, will be found, if they exist, in family, local and state records.

Second: The colonial period of American history is not documented in the National Archives; very few records predate the Revolutionary War. Most of the records in NARA pertain to the nineteenth century (1800's), a time when government did not touch the lives of most Americans to the extent that it does today. Wartime as one big exception and consequently military records are useful to many genealogists.

Third: The nature of the archives: records are arranged to reflect their original purposes, usually just as they were kept by the agency that created them. They cannot be arranged in ways that might seem most helpful to genealogists. Names are not listed alphabetically in census records, for example; the records are arranged geographically because the primary reason for taking the census was to determine a state's representation in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Because of these limitations, a researcher should never ask an archivist for information about an ancestor about whom only the name is known. The researcher should come to the archives with information about when and how and if possible, where an ancestor came into contact with the federal government; sometimes the exact date and place and circumstances of contact are necessary

National Archives, Pacific Region, Riverside County, CA - How to Find Microfilms in the Facility

I am beginning a new series of blogs, dealing with the microfilm holdings at the Pacific Region of the [National Archives in Riverside](#), California, located near Perris at 23123 Cajalco Road. There are a number of microfilms (many with material that would be helpful for genealogists) housed at that location, but people are not aware of them. Here I will discuss some of them in detail, but first, let's look at how to find them.

Step One - Log onto the [NARA](#) (National Archives and Records Administration) website. The new home page looks like this:

In response to many researcher requests, we have added a **list of the records digitized by our digitization partners**, Ancestry.com and Footnote.com, to our web site. The list is arranged in alpha-numeric order by NARA microfilm publication number. You can re-sort the list by microform publication title, partner, or record group by clicking on the appropriate column headings. Clicking on the titles in the list will direct you to the web sites of our partners.

Our digitization partners, Ancestry.com and Footnote.com, have digitized selected NARA microfilm publications and original records and made them available on their web sites for a fee. Each partner allows free searches of some or all index terms for each title. Access to the digitized records on Ancestry.com and Footnote.com is available free of charge in all NARA Research Rooms, including those in our regional archives and Presidential libraries.

What Other Information Is Available

Just a few things that are available either through the National Archives or their partners, Ancestry.com or Fold3.com

Civil War “Widows Pensions” Applications (in process of being digitized by footnote)

These records had never been microfilmed.

Case Files of Approved Pension Applications of Widows and Other Veterans of the Army and Navy who served mainly in the Civil War and the War with Spain.

“Citizens File” of Confederate Papers (Footnote)

Hundred of thousands of transactions between individuals and businesses with the Confederate War Department or Treasury Department for goods and services in the southern states during the Civil War.

“Amnesty Papers” or Former Confederate Sympathizers (Footnote)

Between 1863 and 1868 President’s Abraham Lincoln and Andrew Johnson issued amnesty proclamations “Pardoning” those who had supported the confederacy during the Civil War. They were forced to make applications for pardon. (This series consists of about 14,000 applications)

Other Information

Turner-Baker Papers (footnote)

Turner was an Army Judge Advocate from 1862 to 1866. The records he created document disloyalty, government fraud, draft resistance, contraband trade, Confederate deserters, blockage runners and prisoners in Federal prisons. Baker was Provost Marshal and Special Agent from 1861 to 1865. The records he created document abandoned rebel property near Washington D.C., government fraud, contraband trade, subversive activities, and those reported to be secessionists.

Mormon Battalion Pension Files

The Mormon Battalion was a volunteer unit of just over 500 men recruited from members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Council Bluffs, Iowa during the Mexican War. The unit marched nearly 2,000 miles to San Diego during the war, passing through what would become Kansas, New Mexico and Arizona. They were a significant element in the war in which California, and much of the American Southwest, was added to the territory of the United States. Many of the members of this unit later became major figures in the settlement and development of the southwestern states, including one notable settlement in San Bernardino, California shortly after statehood. These pension files contain similar documentation to other pension files of the Mexican War.

Court Slave Records for D.C. (footnote)

In order for slave owners to claim compensation for the emancipation of their property they were required to file papers with the U.S. Circuit Court for the District of Columbia by July 15, 1862 documenting the action for each slave. The court also held records relating to voluntary manumission of slaves from 1857-1862 and cases relating to fugitive slaves dating from 1851 -1862.

World War II War Diaries (in process of being digitized by footnote)

These records had never been microfilmed.

Records from the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations

For the Navy, Coast Guard and Marine Corps Commands

As well as all Military Governments and Multi-National Commands

Rolls of California Indians (1928, 1948, 1972 enrollments)

In 1928 the State of California sued the Federal Government on behalf of the California Indians. The Federal Government had never ratified any of the 18 treaties since 1852. These enrollments were census forms to find the decedents of these Indians.

Final Statements, 1862 – 1899 (in process of being digitized by footnote)

These records had never been microfilmed. Records of Regular Army Enlisted Men who died while on active duty.

Finding Los Angeles Naturalization Records

Los Angeles District Court, 1887-1991
Los Angeles Superior Court, 1850-1915

For foreign-born residents of the United States to become citizens they had to go through a process known as naturalization. Throughout most of the Nation's history, an alien who had lived in the country for two years could file a **Declaration of Intention** with a court of record. This document declared the applicant's intention to become a U.S. citizen and renounce all foreign allegiances. After three years the applicant could file a **Petition for Naturalization**, which if approved, admitted the applicant as a citizen of the United States. Both the Declaration and the Petition contain valuable information for genealogists.

Step 1. To locate the Naturalization documents you must first search one of three indices on microfilm to find the **Petition Number**. Use the following indexes for a given time period.

Locating a Revolutionary War Military File:

1. Use microfilm M860, **General Index to Compiled Military Service Records of Revolutionary War Soldiers**, to locate a soldier's regiment number or name, and state. The 58 rolls of the index are organized alphabetically by the soldiers' last names. The alphabetical range of each roll is marked on the outside of the box. These rolls are found in cabinets 7A – 9A.
